Several of the costumes worn are original, brought by the dancers from different regions of Bulgaria. The red, green, and white ribbons represent the colors of the Bulgarian flag.

In central Croatia, St. John's Day is celebrated with song and ritual gift-giving. Croatian composer Emil Cossetto has recreated the events of this day in music. The young girls –Ivancice—lead the villagers into the fields at dawn, placing evergreen wreaths and asking the ancient fertility god Lado to grant the village a fine harvest. The villagers then gather in the town square to sing and dance.

## Dances from Međimurje

Radost Children's Group Choreography + Nena Šokčić Music + Lado Folk Dance Ensemble of Croatia

Međimurje is an area of northeast Croatia heavily influenced by the culture of the neighboring Hungarians. On Sundays, young people gather in the village square to meet their friends and dance. These dances are accompanied by a tamburica orchestra and feature humorous songs about village life.

#### Thracian Suite

This dance combines the three most typical dances from the Thracian ethnographic region in Bulgaria – Ruchenitsa, Pravo Horo, and Trite Puti. The richness of the soil in this area has influenced the people and their dances; they are slow, calm, and secure. The people experience the dances deeply in their hearts and express through them strong feelings of joy and happiness.

#### Fecioreasca Fetelor Din Crihalma

Girls' Dance from Crihalma Ensemble, joined by Radost alumnae Choreography + Valeriu Buciu Music + Traditional, arr. Alexandru Viman

In the early 20th century, many Romanian men left their villages to work abroad. During this period, in towns like Crihalma in southeastern Transylvania, the women took over some of the men's traditional social functions. This carried over onto the dance floor, where women danced in a playful imitation of masculine style. As they dance, the women shout strigaturi, improvised folk poetry referring to love, romance, dancing and the fact that "there are no girls like the ones from Crihalma!"

#### Crossroads

Two Vlach couples, Balkan shepherding nomads, meet at the crossroads of history and geography: one displays the staccato traditions specific to the Vlachs while the other dances as all of modern Europe dances. Through its changing moods and syncopated footwork, this dance explores the past and present of an ancient people.

#### Lost in Thirteen

The asymmetrical time signature 13/16 is typical of the Thracian region of Bulgaria. Contemporary musicians take the traditional Krivo Horo into new realms, inspiring the dancers to get lost somewhere between old and new.

#### Lile, Lile

Soloists + Georgi Iliev, Petur Iliev

This is a fast Bulgarian Shope dance in 9/8 – Daichovo Horo. It is one of the few dances from the Samokov area in the Shope region which has kept its authentic form: a leader calls the dance and the dancers must follow.

## Dansuri de pe Tîrnave

Dances from along the Tîrnava Rivers Bokréta Hungarian Dance Ensemble Choreography • Glenn Nielsen Music • Traditional, arr. Ferenc Sebő

This suite of dances from southern Transylvania begins with Purtata Fetelor, a dance for women who sing of the good looks and fickle hearts of young men. Next are two dances for trios: Învîrtita, a slow turning dance, and Purtata, a circle dance. Men join the trios for the Haidau, a competitive boot-slapping dance performed with the support of a stick or a woman's hand. Finally, the dancers pair up for Haṭegana, a fast turning dance.

#### Petur Iliev

Dancer, Choreographer, Concert Director

Mr. Iliev was born in the Shope region of Bulgaria. He graduated from the National School of Choreography and earned his Masters at the National Institute of Dance and Music in Sofia. He has performed as a principal dancer with the Kutev Music & Dance Ensemble and also trained at the National Dance Institute in New York. Petur teaches dances he grew up with as well as dances he has learned on numerous research

trips throughout Bulgaria. He currently lives in Chicago and teaches in the School of Ballet Chicago's Summer Program.

## Yordanka Ilieva

Vocalist

Ms. Ilieva comes from the village of Borika in the Sofia region of Bulgaria. She grew up singing and dancing with her family. She went to Sofia at a young age to sing with the Shopski Ensemble. In Sofia, she met Georgi Iliev. Together, they founded the Gabra Folkloren Ensemble, performing throughout Europe and for the former president of Bulgaria. Yordanka has received 6 gold medals for her solo performances at Koprivshtitsa National Festival and has enjoyed wide acclaim for her recordings.

## Georgi Iliev

Dancer & Choreographer

Mr. Iliev was born in Gabra, Bulgaria, into a family of musicians and dancers. Founder and former director of Gabra Folkloren Ensemble, he has worked to preserve traditional dancing in Bulgarian villages. His group has won gold medals at Koprivshtitsa National Festival, as far back as 1967. Georgi has also taught at the Eastern European Folklore Center summer camps. Sedi Dimka and Lile Lile are dances of his which have made their way to the U.S.

#### Daniela Makedonska

Dance Master & Choreographer

Ms. Makedonska is a graduate of Bulgaria's National School



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of Choreography. She has performed professionally with the Trakia Ensemble in Sofia, and has been an award-winning choreographer for young people with Bankia Ensemble and Rosna Kitka. In April 2004, she began teaching a Bulgarian dance technique class under the auspices of Radost Folk Ensemble, and continues to infuse her teaching with a deep love of folklore and Bulgarian heritage.

## Tchavdar Jirov

Tupan

Mr. Jirov studied percussion at the Music Conservatory in Sofia, Bulgaria. For fifteen years he played folk music and was active in the Bulgarian rock scene. Since 1991 he has been playing and producing dance music in Seattle, notably with the Spanish alternative band "206."

#### Vassil Bebelekov

Gaida

Mr. Bebelkov was born in Dervin in the Rhodope Mountains of Bulgaria. The majestic kaba gaida played by his grandfather inspired Vassil to a life of folk music. He joined the ensemble Sto Kaba Gaida at age 11, and went on to complete his schooling at the Folk Music School in Shiroka Luka and the Plovdiv Folk Music Conservatory. He has performed with Ensemble Trakia, the Philipopolis Ensemble, and recorded for Radio Sofia. More recently, he was a visiting professor in the

Ethnomusicology Department at UCLA. Vassil lives in California where he makes gaidas and teaches.

#### Strahil Vankov

Accordion

Mr. Vankov mastered the accordion playing in his native Bulgaria. He comes from a family of musicians and at an early age began playing the bagpipe and the accordion. In 1998 he graduated from The Shiroka Luka Folk Music School in Bulgaria, and then went on to perform and tour with some of the most prominent Bulgarian folk music orchestras. Since coming to the U.S. he has been teaching music in Chicago and performing around the country with his Kolorit Orchestra.


